Auction Highlights

David Hunt

I think collections of blocks of four look really nice, but unfortunately that mode of collecting seems not to be as popular as it once was. Cost is likely a factor, and if dealers find it easier to sell four singles to different customers than to sell one expensive block, the block gets separated. Auction 126 has a number of reasonably priced blocks (and one or two expensive ones); buy them now before they get broken up.

The 8¢ Tom Sawyer stamp of 1972 is a gold mine of color shifts. Minor shifts are so common I sometimes think it is more difficult to find a well registered stamp than one with a small color shift. Major color shifts are less common, of course, but they can be dramatic (lots 14 and 15).

Lot 78 presents an interesting question about the DAV/MIA pair. Is this a color shift or a perf shift? I'll let you decide.

I don't remember a Duck stamp EFO in our past auctions, so maybe lot 102 is a first for us. Duck stamps are popular with collectors; I guess we'll see if EFO Duck stamps are as popular with EFO collectors. The black engraving is somewhat hidden in the dark area of the duck's breast, but the shift is obvious in the plate number.

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New Zealand Errors Part 3

2003 Scenic Definitives

50¢ Ailsa Mountains (Silver Overprint)

The 50¢ stamp depicts Ailsa Mountains, which form a magnificent western backdrop to Lake Wakatipu, in the South Island's Fiordland region, towering over 3500 metres above sea level. The technical details are: Date of issue: 7 May 2003; designer: CommArts Design, Wellington, New Zealand; printer: Southern Colour Print, Dunedin, New Zealand; stamp size: 30mm x 25mm; sheet Size: 100; paper Type: gummed -De la Rue 103gsm red phosphor coated litho stamp paper; and perforation: 13.5 x 13.25.

One major error was reported on this stamp:

A. Large solid silver overprint issued in error and recalled (\$3,000). The silver fern at the lower right corner appears as a big blob rather than showing all the lines in it.

\$1 Coromandel (Silver Overprint)

The Coromandel is a popular scenic travel region in New Zealand. The stamp depicts a seashore scenery.

One major error was reported on this stamp:

A. Major shift of silver overprint appears on the fern on some of the stamps of the 4 in the block. Below, the silver fern appears printed twice in the lower row.



Lower row has the fern printed twice.

Commemoratives

1969 Bicentennial of Captain Cook's Landing: 4¢ Cook and Octant

In 1969, four stamps were issued to commemorate the bicentennial of Captain Cook's landing in New Zealand. The 4¢ stamp depicts a side portrait of Captain Cook with the planet

Joseph Monteiro

Venus crossing the sun together with an old navigational instrument, the octant. The technical details are: Date of issue: 9 October 1969; designers: E Mayo, Christchurch; printers: Harrison and Sons, England; stamp size: 41mm x 25mm; sheet size: 100 stamps per sheet; process: photogravure; perforation: 14.5 x 14; paper type: chalk surfaced, unwatermarked.

One major error was reported on this stamp:

A. Pair imperforate (\$850).

1973 Six Commemoratives: 8¢ Olympic Rowers

In 1973, six stamps were issued by New Zealand Post to commemorate various anniversaries. The 8¢ stamp depicts New Zealand's rowers at the 1972 Olympics. The technical details are: Date of issue: 7 February 1973; designers: V. Jepsen, Christchurch, and B. Langford, Christchurch; printers: Harrison and Sons, England; stamp size: 40.64mm x 24.13mm; sheet size: 100 stamps per sheet; process: lithography; 14 x 13; paper type: chalk surfaced, perforation: unwatermarked.

A major error was reported on this stamp:

A. Gold colour doubled (\$180): The gold Olympic symbol on the right top, the gold circles and the text at the top left all appear doubled.



Note the printing in gold appears doubled.

1975 Forest Parks

In 1975, New Zealand issued a set of four stamps. The 18¢ stamp depicts the Kaweka Forest Park. This park of 61,000 hectares, lies in the Kaweka Ranges east of the Ngaruroro River, 65 kilometres northeast of Napier. The technical details are: Date of issue: 4 June 1975; designer: M. Chapman,

Christchurch; printers: Joh Enschedé, Netherlands; stamp size: 38.9mm x 34.4mm; sheet size: 100 stamps per sheet; process: photogravure; perforation: 13.5; paper type: chalk surfaced, unwatermarked.

One major was reported:

A. Dark blue colour omitted (\$450): The effect of the missing colour is that the trees appear red instead of brown and the rest of the vegetation appears as light green instead of dark green.

1980 125th Anniversary of New Zealand's First Stamps: 14¢ Strip of Three

Three stamps commemorating the 125th anniversary of the first New Zealand stamp issue were designed by D. A. Hatcher. These stamps were also incorporated into a special miniature sheet. The 14¢ x 3 stamps featured reproductions of the first New Zealand stamps depicting Queen Victoria. The technical details are: Date of issue: 7 February 1980; designers: R. M. Conly, Christchurch, and D. A. Hatcher, Auckland; printers: Harrison and Sons, England; stamp size: 40.64mm x 24.13mm; process: lithography; perforation: 14¢ se-tenant strip stamps: 13.75 x 13.25; paper type: Harrison and Sons, unwatermarked.

One major error was reported:

A. Black colour omitted (\$750): The black text at the bottom left side of the stamp is missing, including 'New Zealand'.



1998 Scenic Skies: \$1 Mt. Maunganui Sunset

New Zealand Post issued in 1998 a set of six stamps depicting scenic skies. One of the stamps depicts the sunset over Mount Maunganui. The technical details are: Date of issue: 29 July 1998; designer: Cato Design, Wellington; printer: Southern Colour Print, New Zealand; stamp size: 50mm x 25mm; sheet size: 100 stamps; process: lithography; perforation: 14.7; paper type: 103 gsm red phosphor coated.

One major error was reported:

A. Silver colour shift (\$650). The silver colour outline is shifted by 12.5mm to the right creating a very distinct impression.

2000 Scenic Reflections: \$1.20 Rainbow Mountain

In 2000, New Zealand issued a set of stamps depicting its scenic reflections. The \$1.20 stamp depicts Rainbow Mountain Scenic Reserve. This is a colourful part of Bay of Plenty's volcanic landscape of boiling mud and steaming pools. The technical details are: Date of issue: 7 July 2000; designer: Donna McKenna, Wellington; printer: Southern Colour Print, New Zealand; stamp size: 40mm x 30mm; sheet size: 100 stamps; process: lithography; perforation: 14; paper type: 103gsm De la Rue red phosphor coated.

One major error was reported:

A. Perforation Shift (\$675): The horizontal perforation is shifted down resulting in the inscription "Rainbow Mountain Scenic Reserve" appearing at the bottom of stamp instead of at the top. As a result, the stamps in the bottom row do not have the inscription and have a large white border.

2001 100 Years of Tourism: \$1.20 Sea-Kayaking

To promote tourism, New Zealand issued in 2001 a set of nine stamps. One of these stamps, the \$1.50 value, depicts seakayaking at Abel Tasman National Park. Sea-kayaking around the Park's golden sand beaches is a unique experience, with its inlets, islands and an abundance of marine life to observe. The technical details are: Date of Issue: 4 July 2001; designer: Designworks, Wellington; printers: Southern Colour Print, New Zealand; stamp size: 40.61mm x 35mm; sheet size: 50 stamps; process: lithography; perforation: 14.25 and die cut; and paper type: 103gsm De la Rue red phosphor coated.

One major perforation error was reported:

A. Perforation shift (\$700): The horizontal perforation is shifted down and, as a result, the name of the country is split in two and appears at the top and bottom of the stamps, except in the last row, where the bottom contains a larger white border.

2004 Olympic Games: \$2.00 Peter Snell

The \$2 Olympic Games stamp depicts Peter Snell who captured the gold at the Rome Olympics in 1960 for the 100 metre race. He beat Moens in the last 10 metres. The technical details are: Date of issue: 2 August 2004; stamp designer: Saatchi & Saatchi, Wellington; printer: Xtreme Graphics, USA; stamp size: 45mm x 30mm; sheet size: 16 stamps and strip of four; perforation: die cut; period of sale: Unless stocks are exhausted earlier, these stamps and first day cover will remain on sale until close of business 1 August 2005.

One major error was reported on this stamp:

a. Illustration inverted (\$6,000): The lenticular printing was reversed in comparison to the lithographic printing at the left side. It is worthwhile noting that the lenticular printing is shifted to the right as a result the first part of the 'N' of New Zealand is partly cut off and appears on the perforation.

2004 Olympic Games: 90¢ Yvette Williams

The 90¢ Olympic Games stamp depicts Yvette Williams who won at the Helsinki Olympics in 1952 the gold medal for the high jump. The technical details are the same as those described for the previous stamp.

One major error was reported on this stamp:

A. Illustration shifted upwards (\$250): The figure appears to touch the top horizontal perforation.

2005 Coffee Cups 45¢

To celebrate the café culture New Zealand issued a set of five stamps. The 45¢ stamp depicts the café culture in the 1910s. The café culture first appeared in New Zealand during the early 20th century, as the arriving European immigrants introduced eating establishments with names such as 'coffee shop', 'cafeteria', 'lounge' and 'tea rooms'. The technical details are: Date of Issue: 4 May 2005; stamp designer: Alan Hollows, Stamps Business, New Zealand Post, Wellington; printers: Wyatt & Wilson, Christchurch; stamp size: 31.2mm x 35mm; sheet size: 25; paper type: JAC stamp grade self-adhesive stamp paper; and perforation: Die-cut.

One major error was reported on the 45¢ stamp:

A. Inverted die-cut outline and double phosphor print - 1 normal, 1 inverted (\$750): The inverted die cut would exclude part of the design of the stamp. •



Aerogramme errors have been especially sought after and the gold-medal exhibit "Aerogramme Errors, Freaks and Oddities" debuted in 1994. Other exhibits, including "United States Aerogrammes" and "Aerogrammes of Ethiopia", have significant error content. He has authored several articles concerning aerogrammes, including errors, which have been published over the years, including the announcement of a new error type in the October-December 2004 issue The EFO Collector. He has been active in numerous philatelic societies and is currently president of the Federated Philatelic Clubs of Southern California which sponsors SESCAL (a WSP show), and a member of the board of the AAMS, the Fresno Philatelic Society and the EFOCC. He is the webmaster for SESCAL, the Fresno Philatelic Society, COPAPHIL and his own website, www.aerogramme.com.

Wayne Youngblood

I am a lifelong collector who began at age 8 and never stopped. I have been an interested and involved APS member for more than 35 years, serving as an expertizer for more than 20 years, as a lead instructor for APS Summer Seminar on Philately for 20 years and on the board of directors for 10 years. 

Multiple Impressions, Two Different Circular Dies

Two varieties occur in cases of double impressions with two different dies:

- 1. Both impressions normal and overlapping.
- One impression normal, the second inverted at a lower level.

Dies not known (as reported in the philatelic press): 1ϕ green, set-off print, on the front with 2ϕ carmine, normal. Washington and Franklin peering into each other's eyes.





Die 134 2¢ carmine with die 127 1¢ green on white, Scoyy U429j:

- Size 8, wm 25, knife 25, UPSS CC-1.
- Size 10, wm 22, with doubling of return address, sold for \$425 at auction in October 2009.
- Size 13, wm 27, knife 80, UPSS CC-2.

A 2¢ carmine over 1¢ green, overlapping approximately 3mm, has been reported as having been used and honored by the Post Office for the 3¢ rate!

Die 127 1¢ green with die 143 3¢ dark violet on white, UPSS CC-3/Scott U436i: Size 7, wm 20, knife 35.

Die 134 2¢ carmine with die 132 1½¢ brown on manila wrapper, UPSS CC-4/Scott W485a.

Die 143 3¢ dark violet with die 134 2¢ carmine on white, Scott U436j:

- Size 8, wm 20, knife 41, UPSS CC-5,
- Size 8, wm 20, knife 42, UPSS CC-6,
- Size 8, wm 20m reported unused from a New York bank, 3¢ wraps around the edge, UPSS CC-11,
- Size 10, wm 20, knife 59, UPSS CC-7.
- Size 17, wm 20, knife 89, UPSS CC-8.



Die 148, 4¢ black with die 134 2¢ carmine on white, size 21, wm 22m knife 100, UPSS CC-9/Scott U440a.


Note that the UPSS CC-10 designation has not been assigned.

Reverse Fold



Printed envelope blank is folded with the stamp imprint on the inside. The printed design will read normally from the printed inside of the envelope but appear to be reversed from the front of the envelope. Albino impressions are also known on reverse folded envelopes.

Miscut







Miscut envelopes are sometimes mistakenly labeled as "misplaced stamp." After printing, the paper is cut with the stamp imprint in the wrong location. Stamp imprint may be

slightly offset from the normal position to being located somewhere on the back of the finished envelope.

Doubled and Multiple Envelopes



One or more envelopes are folded inside of an outer envelope. Doubled envelopes have been observed with as many as four envelopes folded together. Typically, the inside envelopes have albino impressions.

Tape Spliced or "Paste-Up" Envelopes



Pressman's (production or tape) splice: Double-sided manila paper tape was used to join rolls of paper while on the printing press. This allowed continuous operation of the press when changing paper. This tape does not show on either side of the seam, being slabbed between the ends of the two paper rolls being spliced. But, you can hold it up to the light and clearly see the tape, about 1" to 1.25" wide. Any envelopes printed over the splice should have been discarded. Luckily, for collectors, some of these spliced envelopes escaped inspection.



Papermaker's splice or paste-up: splice made at the paper mill during the assembly of rolls of paper. The papermaker's splices are much wider (about 4") than the pressman's splices.

Both types of splice appear diagonally across the envelope.

Freaks

Underinked

These have faint, pale printed impressions and have little or no value above the normal.

Underinked/No Embossing



These have incomplete impressions as they have no embossing. Ken Lawrence provided following information on the Virtual Stamp Club bulletin board: "Any impression cylinder can be released on a web-fed press. This may be from the head of the web as it was threaded through the press at the start of the run (therefore the trailing end unwinding after printing). Or from a repair or splice between torn segments of one roll or pasting the end of one onto the next."

Albino






Albino stamp impressions have been reported since the first Nesbitt issue. High speed equipment for manufacturing the Mercantile and the circular die issues greatly increased the occurrence of albinos. Some post offices treated albinos as "postage due" and others accepted them. The official position was that "albino stamped envelopes are valid for postage even though uncolored. However, albinos and reverse folded envelopes should be turned in for redemption."

Most circular die albinos are the result of printing on multiple layers of envelope blanks. The top sheet receives the inked impression; the bottom sheet(s) receive only the embossing. Envelopes with both an albino stamp and albino corner card are not terribly uncommon. Many albinos saw postal use.

Albino impressions should not occur on envelopes printed on web fed equipment.

Partial Albino





Left: 75% albino; Right: 99% albino.

A range of partial albino impressions is known. They range from a very small area to almost the entire impression being colorless. They were usually caused by foreign material on the press between the envelope blank and the inked die. The 99% albino shown above appears to be an inking freak

Overinked








Left to right: Minor, medium, heavy overinking.

All or part of the stamp is a blurred, thick, heavy impression. Over inked impressions have little or no value above the normal.

PerfOrations: Oddities: The Neglected Part of EFOs John M. Hotchner P.O. Box 1125, Falls Church, VA 22041, jmhstamp@verizon.net

Somehow, the "O" part of "EFO" seems to be odd man out for most of us. We are oriented to misperfs, missing colors, paper folds and creases, and other error and freak material. But the Oddity category can be great fun, and I'll use this and perhaps other columns in the future to display some examples.




First, check out the cover in Figure 1: one of just two examples of Motor Vehicle Tax (MVT) stamps tied on cover that I've seen in 30 years of collecting MVTs. MVTs are listed in Scott's U.S. Specialized using numbers starting with "RV", and there are 41 varieties, used between February, 1943 and June, 1945.

On our cover is an example of RV1, the \$2.09, issued in January, 1942 for use on vehicles from February, 1942. through June 30, 1942. The cancellation date is January 16, 1942, and I have to wonder if it is a First Day cover.

The other known example is the same stamp on a cover cancelled July 2, 1942, so if nothing else my cover is the EKU to date.





Cinderellas, or stamp-like labels, are not usually in the Oddity category. We usually think of these as Christmas or other charity seals, political ad labels, advocacy labels for social causes, and privately produced locals. But once in a while a truly offbeat cinderella qualifies by its nature or its use. One qualification is that you might trip over it for 10¢, but if you went out looking for it, you could not find it for love nor money. A nice example is shown here in Figure 2. It is a pasteone label affixed to 1948 official mail from the Iowa **Employment Security Commission.**

The vast majority of government official mail has preprinted information in the upper right corner to justify a lack of postage stamps. In this case, the paste-on label, rouletted horizontally as if pulled off a roll, substitutes. It is impossible to say how many of these labels have survived on cover, and I challenge you to duplicate it at any price. I paid \$20 for it because the dealer who had it recognized just how unusual it is, but it could have been \$5 or less with another dealer. I'd bet there are fewer of these in existence than there are 24¢ C3a, inverted Curtiss Jennies!



Another cinderella that I think qualifies for the Oddity category is the photographic label on the Chicago World's Fair cover in Figure 3 (previous page). Friend Cheryl Ganz identified the ship as "The City of New York", and ex-whaling vessel used by Adm. Richard Byrd for his 1928 exploration of Antarctica.





The "City of New York" eventually became a museum of polar exploration at the 1933 World's Fair. Another friend, Hal Vogel, came up with a terrific contemporary post card shown in Figure 4 that carries the following text on the address side:

"Admiral Byrd's Polar Ship 'The City of New York' moored at her berth in the lagoon near the foot of Twenty-third street at A Century of Progress Exposition, Chicago's 1933 World's Fair. The famous ship that braved the ice packs and the Antarctic winter to carry Byrd and his crew to Little America, when he flew to the South Pole, appears at the Exposition as a concession. 'The City of New York' is fully equipped and manned by a crew ready for a polar expedition. Four members of Byrd's original crew are on board. Below decks in the hold is a complete museum of historic relics and objects brought back from the Antarctic."

It is hard today to picture the audience-appeal of this expedition or relics of it, but if you think of this as being the 1928 equivalent of the 1969 Moon Landing by the United States, you might get a sense of how the public viewed it.





Finally, the two Bank Note-era stamps in Figure 5 are acquisitions 20 years apart. Both have a punched "BC" in the stamp. The first is the 3c 1879 soft paper (Scott No. 184), and the second is a 2c first design postage due, bright claret in color, Scott No. J23. It is evident that the two "BC"s have been punched by different devices. I wondered aloud in a Linn's column in 1990 whether the "BC" had any postal meaning?

Readers responded with the theory that the punches were applied with a standard railroad conductor's hand punch that indicated "Baggage Check." There would be other punches such as "L" for Limit, and "1/2" for Half Fare Child, but I have never seen them used in stamps.

Clearly, there is a wide world of Oddities out there to spice up your collecting pleasure. Should you have any in your collection, I and our editor would welcome your writing them up for the EFOC. 
Book Review: Stamp Counterfeiting by Howard K. Petschel

Stamp Counterfeiting: The Evolution of an Unrecognized Crime by Howard K. Petschel, 2011 183 6"x9" pages, color softcover. eight black and white illustrations.

For those familiar with Petschel's earlier work Spurious Stamps: A History of U.S. Postal Counterfeits (1997), you will find the new book a nice addition to your library as it differs significantly from the first. That book surveyed the field. The new book goes into much more depth on the stories of the people involved in counterfeiting the U.S. stamps of 1894-96, how they were tracked down, by whom, and how their investigations altered the U.S. stamp program. There is similar treatment of the 1902 1c Jefferson postal fakes, the 2c Washington Head, World Wart I War Savings stamps, and the 2c Fourth Bureau issue. Petschel's view is that of a retired Postal Inspector, who worked counterfeiting cases during his career, so his stories are well researched, detailed, authoritative, and enjoyable reading.

These are actually true crime stories, as they include players from organized crime, murders and other mayhem, connections to counterfeiting of currency, and lack of honor among thieves. Of necessity in telling these stories, the book traces the development of cooperation between, and authorities of the U.S. Secret Service and the Postal Inspection Service .The book also addresses some of the later counterfeits, and contains a section titled, "Is it illegal to collect counterfeit stamps?" I highly recommend the book. It is available from the publisher, Keokee Company Publishing, 405 Church St., Sandpoint, ID 83864. Single copies are \$26 plus \$5 shipping. EFOCC Auction Rules for Consignors

Preparing Lots

Please use a blank form from a recent copy of the EFO Collector. Photocopies are fine. Please use a separate form for each lot.

Secure each lot to the front of the form; attach large lots to the reverse side. Protect all items with mounts, glassine, etc., and stiffeners, if necessary, but be sure item/items can be easily removed by Auction Director for examination and/or photographing. Do not use staples. Attach each item so that the description can be easily read. A simple and easy way to mount lots is to do so on dealer sales cards, or in glassines mounted face down for easy removal.

Include a reserve (minimum bid) or write "none". Lots may be revised to accurately describe items; or returned if necessary. Your name and EFOCC number must be on the consignment form, however, to preserve anonymity, these are removed from the consignment sheet before sending item to successful bidders.

Send consignments to David Hunt, 45 Fairway Drive, Denver, PA 17517. Use insured or registered U. S. Mail.

Consignor Fees

Consignor commission is 10% of the hammer price, with a minimum bid of 50 cents

Unsold lots incur a 50 cent fee per lot, and the consignor pays return postage and

Expenses and printing constraints make it impractical to picture every lot, especially those which are large in size. The EFOCC will exercise discretion in picturing lots.

Consignor Special Instructions

To save postage and labor, EFOCC can automatically re-submit unsold lots with lower minimums in a future auction, if you instruct EFOCC clearly what to do.

If you send duplicate or very similar lots, it is consignor's responsibility to state clearly if you would like to have these placed in different sales. Generally, EFOCC places all items received in the same sale to minimize paperwork.

Consignment/Payment Timing

EFOCC receives consignments continually and prepares them for subsequent sales, roughly on a first-in/first-out basis. However, large lots may be spread over several auctions.

After the close of each sale, unsold lots are offered to bidders on a first come-first served basis for \$1 over the reserve with no buyer's commission or postage. This increases total sales, makes more bidders happy, and sells more lots for consignors, all for very little additional effort.

EFOCC needs approximately one month after auction's closing date to determine successful bidders, prepare and mail invoices, mail lots, receive payment from winners, list after sale lots and accept their offers, etc., etc. Thus, consignors can expect to receive payment about four to six weeks after an auction closes.

Bidding Precautions

Minimum bids are not estimates, but are true reserves established by the consignors. Bids below the listed reserve will not be accepted.

Bidders are responsible for inaccurate bids. Bids do not have to be typed, but, please, be sure numbers and amounts are clearly legible. Confirm phone and e-mail bids with a written bid sheet.

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


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














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
